After graduating with a Fine Arts Degree, Marvin continued independent studies with photographers Wynn Bullock, Ansel Adams, Roger Minick, Paul Caponigro, Ted Orland, Steve Kiser and Geir Jordahl to name a few. Most of Marvin's professional career was spent as an art director, graphic designer, architectural photographer and an Associate Professor of Design at San Jose State University.
